



WHAT IS THE PREMIER DEVELOPMENT LEAGUE?

The BYU Men's Soccer Team left the Collegiate Club division of soccer and began playing in the Premier Development League in May of 2003. Part of the United Soccer Leagues, this league provides the year round competition necessary to develop individual and team skills that in hand will better prepare them for success in their international travels.

BYU was the first University sponsored soccer program to ever purchase a franchise and that will compete at a level considered higher than NCAA soccer in the pyramid of US soccer development.

The Premier Development League (PDL) is the amateur league of the United Soccer Leagues in the United States and Canada, forming part of the American Soccer Pyramid. It is currently the top level men's amateur competition in the United States and is considered to be the fourth tier of competition, behind Major League Soccer, the USL First Division and the USL Second Division, and roughly equal with the National Premier Soccer League and the Pacific Coast Soccer League.

As PDL seasons take place during the summer months, the player pool is drawn mainly from elite NCAA college soccer players seeking to continue playing high level soccer during their summer break, which they can do while still maintaining their college eligibility.

While the majority of players do not receive payment, the PDL prides itself on its professionalism in terms of its organization and the way the league is run, and its dedication to developing young soccer players, preparing them for future careers in professional leagues in the United States and elsewhere.

PDL rules dictate that a maximum of eight players on each team's 26-man roster can be over 23 years old, while at least three players on each team's roster must be 18 or younger. BYU is allowed exemption from this rule.

BYU will compete the 2009 season in the Southwest Division of the Western Conference against teams from Azusa (Los Angeles Legends), Bakersfield (Bakersfield Brigade), Fresno (Fresno Fuego), Irvine (Orange County Blue Star), La Mirada (Southern California Seahorses), Lancaster (Lancaster Rattlers), Los Angeles (Los Angeles Legends), Ogden (Ogden Outlaws) and Ventura (Ventura County Fusion).

UVU: ONCE A TECHNICAL COLLEGE, NOW A UNIVERSITY

FALL EXHIBITION GAME 1-BYU BEATS UTAH STATE WITH TWO LATE GOALS

PROVO, Utah (Sept. 25, 2009) – BYU started the fall exhibition season on the right foot with a 2-0 victory over Utah State Friday night.



"I thought we kept the ball really well," said Head Coach, Chris Watkins. "The movement was really good. The young guys looked ambitious. I was actually quite proud of the way we played in general. Finishing left a little bit to be desired but it was a good game. We created a lot of good shots and we really looked smart."

Freshman, Nils Lofgren scored the game winner in the 81st minute off a well-timed pass by Senior, Drew VanWagenen.

"In the first half I thought he (Lofgren) looked a little bit nervous but once he got that shot off he felt pretty good," said Watkins. "Hopefully he brings that confidence into next week."

"It's a lot of fun out there," said Lofgren. "A ball came across, Drew slid a little farther, and I got lucky and put it in the corner. We kept pounding and pounding and eventually something had to go in."

The Cougars added a penalty kick in the 88th minute when Lofgren was fouled and Senior, Brit Osborne put the penalty in the back of the net. "I'm not the best PK taker," said Osborne. "I haven't converted the last three I've tried. I was pretty nervous. Luckily the keeper went the wrong way."

BYU controlled possession for most of the game and out shot the Aggies, 25-6. Utah State could never sustain any offensive momentum, relying on counter attacks and vertical balls for six shots, two of which were on frame. Since the game was an exhibition there was unlimited subbing as they combined for 33 substitutions throughout the 90 minutes.

In the Cougars starting 11 was just one returning starter and seven freshmen. "I hope to not do it again," Watkins said. "Actually it's not something that we're proud of. Unfortunately our seniors, a couple of them have practice right up until class and they were late to practice. That shouldn't happen. If they're late, we have a team policy."

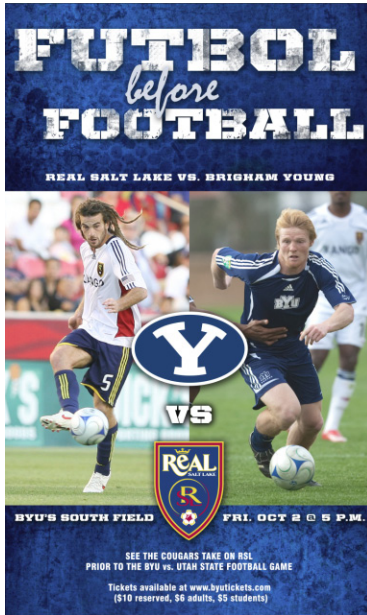
FALL EXHIBITION GAME 2-BYU SCORES AGAINST REAL SALT LAKE

PROVO, Utah (Oct. 2, 2009)— The BYU men's soccer team continued their fall exhibition season with a loss to a physical Real Salt Lake team, 4-1.

"I felt we looked our age," said Head Coach Chris Watkins. "Those guys are a lot faster and they have a lot more experience than us, but we were able to keep up with their pace at a decent level."

The Cougars came out strong, attacking early in the first few minutes of the game, making it appear that it could be an even game. However, RSL quickly took charge, and forward Yura Movsisyan blasted the ball into the back of the net in the 11th minute.

A few minutes later, Movsisyan found the net again as his shot deflected off the post, bounced off BYU goalkeeper Bryan Black, and entered the goal. RSL players Robbie Findley and Nelson Gonzalez also added goals of their own. "They're at the top of their game right now and in great shape," said Black.



"Every touch on the ball is just awesome, and they work really well together as a team. But we do have some disadvantages of size and speed."

BYU prevented a shutout when Sophomore Forward, Blake Tillotson headed the ball past the RSL goalie off a strong cross in the 71st minute.

"It's really nice that we have this opportunity to come down here to play this game," said RSL head coach Jason Kreis. "It's important to us because we have a very long break, and we need competition against an opponent. So for BYU to be here and to present this opportunity is fantastic."

Weber State took advantage of the extra player as former Chivas USA draft pick, Kyle Christensen blasted the ball past BYU keeper Bryan Black on a free kick 30 yards out during the 83rd minute to tie the game at 1-1.

Another yellow card was given to BYU senior defender, KC Whitworth in extra time and with the game tied, a 10-minute sudden death overtime began.

The colored cards were not done being delivered in overtime, as Weber State player Scott Whitesides received a yellow card during the 99th minute. This finished the card war with a combined total of three red and five yellow cards.

BYU showed offensive strength despite being a man down in the first overtime. Weber State came out a lot stronger on offense to begin the second overtime, but BYU made sure that strength was not one-sided. However, neither team could get the game deciding goal resulting in a tie.

"I thought it showed a lot about our team and our character to push for it and make plays even when we were a man down," freshman midfielder, Trevor Henderson said. "We never quit."

FALL EXHIBITION GAME 3-BYU TIES WEBER STATE, 1-1 (2OT) IN PHYSICAL GAME

PROVO, Utah (Oct. 16, 2009) -- The BYU Cougars tied Weber State, 1-1 after two over time periods, against considered best in-state rival, Weber State, in a game filled with tempers and fouls.

"I'm quite happy with the way we played," said head coach Chris Watkins. "I'm really proud of what my guys did tonight."

The game started with an explosion of speed, energy, and emotion from both sides of the field and continued throughout the game.

The Cougars scored in 45th minute as freshman midfielder, Trevor Henderson connected with sophomore forward, Blake Tillotson who blasted the ball into the net to make it 1-0 at the half.

"My teammates battled and stepped up their game," Tillotson said. "Trevor put it to my foot and I was able to get a good touch on it."

Tempers continued to rise when in the 48th minute, Tillotson and Weber State's Aaron McKinley tangled, resulting in both receiving a red card and ejection from the game.

In the 55th minute BYU senior defender, Drew VanWagenen received a red card as well, leaving the Cougars down two players, playing 9 on 10.

Two Weber State players also received yellow cards simultaneously in the 66th minute.

At one point BYU won 30 straight games at the Club National Championships. This dominance led the program to seek higher quality competition in order to create an environment where players could develop and the team could be challenged.

PUT YOUR BEST INJURED FOOT FORWARD

BYU has three experienced forwards out due to injury. Zach De Francis still has issues with his broken arm suffered during the end of the PDL season, BJ Pugmire will be cleared in December to run again after tearing an ACL during the season, and Brady Marshall fractured his pubic bone and is out for at least two months. Freshman midfielder Matt Josse also broke his foot in practice last week.

THE STADIUM AT SOUTH FIELD

The Stadium at South Field is home to both the men and women's soccer teams at BYU. The women are currently playing their regular season.

In 2008 the complex received a major renovation as several bleachers were replaced with a grandstand stadium.

The lighting was also increased to accommodate frequent television broadcasts from the site. Higher quality goal posts and nets were installed as well. The field is 120 x 75 feet.

The 2009 Collegiate National Champion, BYU rugby team also plays games at the Stadium in March and a golf class uses the field as a sort of driving range during the week.

BYU has hosted and played several big time teams in Provo. Prior to the USA Men's National Team World Cup qualifier against Costa Rica in 2005, team trained at the Stadium at South Field. El Salvador also trained at BYU's facili-

ties in September 2009, prior to their game against the USA.

The Cougars have played Real Salt Lake multiple times at home, Coventry City (formerly of the English Premier League), and the Fijian National Team.

What is a mission?

The Church's missionary program is one of its most recognized characteristics. "Mormon" missionaries can be seen on the streets of hundreds of major cities in the world as well as in thousands of smaller communities.

More than 50,000 missionaries are serving missions for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints at any one time. Most are young people under the age of 25, serving in nearly 350 missions throughout the world. Missionaries can be single men between the ages of 19 and 25, single women over the age of 21 or retired couples. Missionaries receive their assignment from



Church headquarters and are sent only to countries where governments allow the Church to operate.

Missionaries do not request their area of assignment and do not know beforehand whether they will be required to learn a language. Prior to going to their assigned area, missionaries spend a short period of time at one of 17 missionary training centers throughout the world. There they learn how to teach the gospel in an orderly and clear way and, if necessary, they begin to learn the language of the people they will be teaching.

The largest training center is in Provo, Utah, with additional centers in Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Dominican Republic, England, Guatemala, Japan, Mexico, New Zealand, Peru, the Philippines, Spain and South Korea. A typical missionary day begins by waking at 6:30 a.m. for personal study.

The day is spent proselytizing by following up on appointments, visiting homes or meeting people in the street or other public places. Missionaries end their day by 10:30 p.m. In some parts of the world, missionaries are sent only to serve humanitarian or other specialized missions.

Those missionaries do not proselytize. Missionary work is voluntary. Missionaries fund their own missions — except for their transportation to and from their field of labor — and are not paid for their services.

Contacts with family and friends during this time of service are limited to letters and occasional phone calls to family at special times. Missionaries avoid entertainment, parties or other activities common to this age-group as long as they are on their missions, so they can focus entirely on the work of serving and of teaching others the gospel of Jesus Christ.
